Trail Rules

Pets must be leashed and waste removed.

Motorized vehicles, including snow-mobiles and ATVs, are prohibited (except powered wheelchairs).

Alcoholic beverages, glass bottles, and illegal drugs are not permitted.

Firearms, fireworks, and fires are not permitted.

Littering is not permitted.

Posted curfew regulations must be observed.

Trail Etiquette

Obey all traffic signs, markers and signals.

Travel at a reasonable speed and in a consistent and predictable manner and in no case faster than 15 mph.

All trail users should use a light and reflectors after dusk and before dawn.

Always look ahead and behind when passing.

Pass slower traffic on their left; yield to oncoming traffic when passing.

Give a clear warning signal before passing.

Move off the trail when stopped to allow others to pass.

Yield to other users when entering and crossing the trail.

A Wheels yield to heels.


